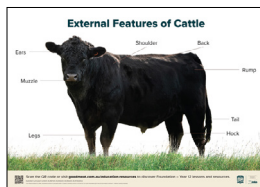

Did you know?

Farmers grow plants and animals that are suited to a particular area and its seasons.

Angus cattle are suited to southern parts of Australia because the weather is cooler. They have thick coats, which help them stay warm when it is cold.

Brahman cattle are more suited to living in the northern parts of Australia. They can live in hot conditions, and they have dark skin under their coats so they don't burn easily. Their loose skin also helps them stay cool.
